Historical Sites

Black History Walking Tour

The Underground Railroad was a network of secret routes and safe houses established in the United States during the early to mid-19th century. It was used by enslaved African Americans to escape into free states and from there to Canada. The network, primarily the work of free African Americans, was assisted by abolitionists and others sympathetic to the cause of the escapees. The slaves who risked capture and those who aided them are also collectively referred to as the passengers and conductors of the Railroad, respectively. Various other routes led to Mexico, where slavery had been abolished, and to islands in the Caribbean that were not part of the slave trade. The network, generally known as the Underground Railroad, which began in the early 1800s, ran north and grew steadily until the Emancipation Proclamation was signed by President Abraham. One estimate suggests that as many as 100,000 slaves had escaped to freedom via these networks.

Niagara was a key location in the legendary Underground Railroad that led an estimated 40,000 enslaved people to freedom throughout the 19th century.

The Black History Walking our is a self-guided walking tour. You can download the app at vofpark.org and listen to the diverse voices of people of African descent, their stories, experiences, and journeys, all told in the heart of Niagara On-the-Lake.

Fort George

A military post that the British used to defend Upper Canada (which was part of Ontario) against an attack by the Thirteen American colonies after the Americans formally declared war on the United Kingdom June 8, 1812. Niagara On-the Lake and Niagara Falls were central to the American strategy of invading Canada. The "Battle of Fort George" took place from May 25 to 27 and constituted some of the fiercest fighting during the War of 1812. The fort was captured by the Americans but after many defeats in surrounding battles was abandoned in December 1813. Ultimately, the War gave Canadians their first sense of community.

Soldiers in red coats and their families share stories about life in the days before the fort fell to American forces. Six cannons remain on the lookout to this day. You can wander through eight restored buildings, hear military music performed by the 41st Fife and Drum Corps, watch musket demonstrations and enjoy beautiful views of the Niagara River. Trained interpreters are available to share the stories.

Queenston Heights

Queenston Heights is a geographical feature of the Niagara Escarpment immediately above the village of Queenston, 15 minutes from Niagara On-the-Lake. It forms a cliff face of approximately 300 feet.

Queenston Heights is the site of the War of 1812 Battle of Queenston Heights, where Major-General Sir Isaac Brock was killed in action in the defence of Upper Canada (now Ontario). He died by gunshot wound to the chest on October 13, 1812, leading a charge of British regulars and Canadian militia up the Heights to regain some previously captured territory. Ultimately, the combined British, Canadian, and First Nations forces won a resounding victory under the command of Major-General Roger Hale Sheaffe. General Brock's dramatic death provided a rallying point during and after the war as a symbol of Canadian independence from the United States.

A campaign began among prominent Upper Canadians to honour Brock leading to the erection of Brock's Monument, a 185-foot column with a viewing platform.

The Angel Inn

The Angel Inn's rooms, whose thick plank floors were laid in 1815, still echo the sounds of British soldiers and townsfolk who, two centuries ago, gathered here for food, drink, and lodging. The Inn is believed to have been founded around 1789. The town of Newark (as Niagara On-the-Lake was known at the time) was destined to become the first Capital of Upper

Canada and it is known that in 1793, the new Assembly passed an act outlawing slavery, the first such act enacted anywhere in the world. It is believed that the legislators celebrated the event over dinner at the Inn that evening.

The Inn was badly destroyed during the War of 1812-14 and was rebuilt in 1815.

There is a popular local legend (that shows up in accounts dating to the 1820's) of an unfortunate Canadian militia officer who was killed at the Inn during the American invasion of May 1813.

Captain Colin Swayze had delayed joining the British retreat to rendezvous with a young woman, believed to be his true love. Surprised by American soldiers sent to search the Inn, he hid in an empty barrel in the cellar. The Americans used bayonets to prod into every corner and possible place of concealment and the Canadian received a fatal wound.

Some believe the ghost of Captain Swayze is fated to walk the Inn at night in longing for his sweetheart. There have been reports of noises coming from the dining room when it is empty, rearranged place settings, and other unexplained occurrences.

The Apothecary

The Niagara Apothecary is an authentic museum restoration of an 1869 pharmacy as part of a practice that operated in Niagara On-the-Lake from 1818 to 1964.

All the pharmacist-owners during the history of the practice from 1818 to 1964 were individuals who contributed significantly to the health needs of the citizens and the community. All of them remain a part in various ways of what was restored and reopened as a museum in 1971.

The Courthouse

The town was established in 1792 when it was chosen as the first capital of Upper Canada and named Newark by Lieutenant Governor John G. Simcoe. The three-story building contained a courtroom, town hall chambers, offices, and jail cells.

This current building replaced the earlier courthouse for fear of it being in-range of cannon fire from Fort Niagara across the river, and the capital was moved to Toronto in 1796, and Newark's name was changed to Niagara On-the-Lake.

In 1962 the courthouse became home to the Shaw Festival and remained so until 1973 when the Festival Theatre was opened.

The Pumphouse Arts Centre

The Niagara Pumphouse Arts Centre is a not-for-profit organization engaging the community through educational programs, exhibitions, and special events to create, celebrate, and appreciate visual arts. It is the arts hub that connects the community by providing art for all.

Located on the banks of the Niagara River in a heritage building which formerly supplied water to Niagara On-the-Lake, the Centre showcases a diverse array of original works, including paintings, photography, sculpture, woodwork, glass, pottery, textiles, jewellery, and more.

With each season the Pumphouse Arts Centre also provides a mix of programs for children, youths, adults, families, and the community as well as offering space to host meetings and special events such as weddings overlooking the Niagara River.

The Royal George Theatre

The Royal George Theatre began its life as a vaudeville theatre in 1915 occupying a part of Niagara On-the-Lake's heritage district for more than a century, being under the Shaw's ownership for more than four decades.

It was initially an entertainment venue for troops stationed in town during the First World War, then served for years as a movie theatre. The Shaw Festival acquired the space in 1980, hosting dozens of productions since.

The venue, however, has become a liability for the organization in recent years: water leaks and general aging issues, and will shut down at the end of next season, marking the end of an era for the 305-seat theatre stands on the site of a former blacksmith shop.

Polish Soldiers

Remembering Polish soldiers who trained in NOTL 90 years ago

NIAGARA-ON-THE-LAKE — The small plot of graves is immediately distinguishable from the others in St. Vincent de Paul cemetery.

Surrounded by a small iron fence, the 25 graves bare the emblem of a white eagle, the symbol of a free Poland. The names — Michael Byszewski, Jozef Dolwa, Jan Siatkowski — also set them apart.

In these graves, Henry Radecki said, are some of the bravest men in Poland's history.

The soldiers were newly emigrated Polish Americans when they travelled from the U.S. to Niagara-on-the-Lake to train for an independent Polish army during the First World War. Poland didn't even exist at the time, having been occupied for 123 years by other countries.

About 20,000 trainees filed through Niagara-on-the-Lake from 1917 to 1919, sleeping in barns and crude barracks, outnumbering the town's residents. The men in the 25 graves died in the Spanish influenza pandemic.

Each year, local Poles march from downtown Niagara-on-the-Lake to the cemetery plots, commemorating not only the spirit of the volunteers but the liberation of their motherland. This year is the 90th anniversary.

"The cemetery is a symbol only," said Radecki, a retired sociology professor, war veteran and Polish immigrant who helps maintain the plots.

"The cemetery is a symbol of all the others who died outside of the United States and North America, who fought for that ideal of an independent Poland," Radecki said.

Poland's history is complicated and riddled with conflict. In the late 1700s, the country was conquered by Austria, Prussia and Russia, which divided the territory among them, wiping Poland as a country off the map, Radecki said. For the next 123 years, the Polish people revolted, but even the longest and most intense efforts were unsuccessful. The First World War was an opportunity to gain freedom, and the best way to obtain it was siding with the Allies.

To form a Polish army, organizers combed American towns with the largest number of Polish immigrants, ideal because the U.S. was still neutral in the war. But when the U.S. became involved and started drafting soldiers, organizers of the Polish army moved their volunteers to Canada, where they wouldn't be drafted.

The effort in Niagara-on-the-Lake represented the new strength of the Polish people, who still longed to take back their homeland, Radecki said. This makes the small town where initial training was provided very important to Poland's existence as a nation.

The soldiers had occasionally miserable conditions, Radecki said. Four barrack buildings were built, but they housed only about 300 soldiers each, and at any given time, as many as 3,000 men were training. Some slept in tents with their ration of two blankets per man.

Others slept in abandoned canneries, vacant barns or, if they were lucky, public buildings such as town hall. Some local residents housed them for free. The men were paid five cents a day.

While Radecki's research shows some residents were skeptical of this new group, Niagara-on-the-Lake residents were used to soldiers, said Clark Bernat, curator of the Niagara Historical Museum.

"Through the whole World War I era, at any given time, there were as many soldiers in town as there were residents," he said.

The Spanish influenza hit hard, striking many soldiers ill and killing one of the two doctors who cared for the Polish men, Radecki said.

Elizabeth Ascher, a local woman and St. Catharines Standard columnist, cared for many of them, promoting their presence in the community so much that in death she was granted the Cross of the Order of Polonia Restitute.

But the soldiers were a robust group. Of the 22,000 who trained in Niagara-on-the-Lake, only 150 were killed overseas and fewer than 1,000 were wounded.

"It's been said they were the best army at that time in Europe," Radecki said. "They were well-equipped. They could take on any enemy."

The annual ceremony remains important to the Polish community, who see it as a valiant symbol, said Jacek Kaminski, president of the Niagara branch of the Canadian Polish Congress.

"Going over the ocean wasn't as simple as it is today," Kaminski said. "They made one big trip from Europe to America to come here. And when they saw the need, they went back."

About 800 people are expected at this year's parade, which will be Sunday at noon at the cemetery. Festivities, including a fashion show and dancing, will follow in Polonia Park.

Each year, the group that gathers gets a little older, as do the memberships of local Polish organizations, Radecki said.

"But as long as there's one person left to march, there will be a parade."

Are there backstage tours at the Shaw Festival?

Yes. They are offered from May to December at the Festival Theatre from 10 am to 11 am. In May, they are offered on weekends. From June onwards, they run on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays. They are the best deal in Town - \$10 or \$5 with a ticket to a performance.

What is the new Shaw Artists' Village all about?

The Artists' Village is an extension of the current Festival Campus. It will be a new home for education and engagement activities, as well as season housing for Shaw artists, short-term accommodation for visiting students and artists, and a new home for the Shaw's Wardrobe construction area. The Artists' Village occupies the former space of Upper Canada Lodge, a regional long-term care

facility closed in 2025.

Where is the Jackie Maxwell Studio Theatre?

In the Festival Theatre at 10 Queen's Parade.

What is the Spiegeltent?

The Spiegeltent or "Mirror Tent" is a portable nightclub-style venue located on the south lawn at the Shaw Festival Theatre at 10 Queen's Parade. Similar tents were famous throughout the Weimer Republic for their stained and etched glass and mirrors effects but unfortunately few remain. The Shaw's Spiegeltent was brought from Belguim for the 2023 season and has become the home for unique performances designed for the venue.

What is happening to the Royal George Theatre?

The 2025 season will be the last season the Royal George is operational in its current form. What happens next will be dictated by funding decisions but the vision for a new Royal George, guided by the idea that it should "feel the same but better", is a fully accessible building that can meet the needs of audiences and artists while continuing to honour the great jewel box design and historic façade. Interestingly the "historic façade" was created by the Shaw's creative team after it was purchased by the theatre in 1981.

What will the Shaw do while the Royal George is closed?

The 2025 season and several following seasons will include shows at the Court House. This is not a long-term solution as the Town owns the building and it remains a challenging space for accessibility. The plan is to use a much simpler, smaller auditorium set-up than previous years and staging of shows for an appropriate scale.

Parking

How do the parking machines work?

Parking meters accept credit and debit cards, coins and online Honk Mobile App (www.honkmobile.com or via App Store or Google Play) and ParkedIn (https://parkedin.com/ or via App Store or Google Play). The apps accept credit cards for Visa, Mastercard, Masterpass, American Express and PayPal.

Parking rates range between \$5.00 and \$5.50 per hour.

Where can I find free parking in town?

There is free parking the further you get from Queen Street. There are several spots on King Street at Veteran's Way Lane (near the tennis courts), parallel parking on King Street and approximately 2 blocks from Queen Street. Reference the Town website (notl.com) for a map showing the location of paid parking.

Why won't the parking machines accept my payment? It's 9 am and I'm trying to pay.

Paid parking in NOTL extends from 10 am until 7 pm. Parking machines will only accept payment during these hours. If you use one of the online apps, you can pay during the parking period using your phone.

What if a visitor has a parking issue?

Visitors with parking issues should contact the Town at 905 468 3666 ext. 301 or info@notl.com. The Tourism Office cannot assist with parking issues. Note the Town office is not open on weekends.

Where is the closest electric-vehicle charging station?

The closest electric-vehicle charging station is located in the parking lot behind the Court House.

Most hotels have charging stations for guests and two public stations are located at NOTL Hydro, 8 Henegan Road.

Is accessible parking free in Town?

Yes. With a certificate displayed on the dashboard, parking is free in designated paid parking areas.



Walking Tour



- 1. Fort George: located on the Queen's Parade at the end of the Niagara Parkway. Here, you will see staff in period costume and uniform re-enacting typical daily life in the garrison prior to the War of 1812 when Fort George was occupied by the British Army.
- **2. St. Vincent de Paul Roman Catholic Church, circ. 1834.** Niagara's first Roman Catholic Church. Exit Fort George through the main parking lot, to Queen's Parade. Turn right and proceed to the corner of Wellington and Picton.
- **3. St. Mark's Anglican Church.** This churchyard dates from the earliest British settlement. Please see plaque. Turn right onto Wellington Street then turn left onto Byron Street. On the right-hand side of Byron Beside the church, at the corner of
- **4. The Rectory circ. 1858.** This is the town's only Tuscan villa, a very popular house design in the mid-19th century. Located at the corner of Byron and King Streets.
- **5. Masonic Hall (Old Stone Barracks) Circa 1816.** Diagonally across from the Rectory. This was possibly the first meeting site of the Parliament of Upper Canada. This site was used for meetings for the lodge, public and church. It continues to house Upper Canada's first Masonic Lodge.



- **6. Muirhead House. Circ. 1791.** 28 Prideaux. The Muirhead house was rebuilt after retreating American Troops burned down the town in December 1813. The current house was rebuilt sometime around 1817 on the original 1791 fieldstone foundations and the timbers were also reused. This was the home of James Muirhead, army surgeon, magistrate and Major in the Lincoln Militia. He attended the death of General Brock and was subsequently marched to Albany, New York as a noncombatant prisoner in the winter of 1813. The following year, Muirhead was released and returned to Niagara-on-the-Lake and his family, wife Deborah. Deborah was the only daughter to Colonel John Butler. The original Tombstones of Muirhead and his son, Butler can be visited in Butler's Burying Ground. The Niagara Historical Society Museum houses Muirhead's officer's sword and scabbard.
- **7. Stewart-McLeod House. Circ. 1830.** 42 Prideaux. This house was built by the family of Alexander Stewart, the son of a founding member of the Law Society of Upper Canada.
- 8. Kerr-Wooll House "Demeath" circ. 1815. 69 Prideaux. Diagonally opposite to Stewart McLeod House. Built originally and rebuilt after the War of 1812 by Dr. Robert Kerr, physician and surgeon to the Indian department and prominent official.

- 9. Niagara Apothecary. 5 Queen Street. Corner of King and Queen. This is an authentic museum restoration of an 1869 pharmacy as part of a practice that operated in Niagara-on-the-Lake from 1820 to 1964. The Niagara Apothecary at the Sign of the Golden Mortar is an excellent example of high style, eclectic mid-Victorian commercial architecture. The Italianate façade features arched glazed double doors and two arched plate glass show windows with accents of a Florentine "twisted rope" treatment.
- 10. Clock Tower Cenotaph. Centre of Queen Street. This stands as a memorial monument to 10 Niagara-on-the-Lake soldiers who served and had fallen in World War I.
- 11. Court House Building. 1847. 26 Queen Street. In 1862, the courthouse became Town Hall for Niagara-on-the-Lake. In 1981, the Court House became the town's Bicentennial project and houses refurbished Lord Mayor's Chambers, the Chamber of Commerce and Parks Canada offices. Also the building is home to the intimate 327-seat Courthouse Theatre, one of three Shaw Festival Theatres in the Heritage District.
- **12. The Olde Angel Inn. Circ. 1816.** 224 Regent Street Corner of Regent and Market Streets. Built on the foundation of an earlier inn that was destroyed in the War of 1812, the Angel Inn is the oldest operating inn in Canada.
- **13. Blain Lansing Post House. Circ 1835.** 95 Johnson at the corner of Johnson and Victoria Streets. Built by master mason James Blain. Occupied at one time by Mr. Connell, the postmaster, it is now operating as a country inn.
- 14. Vanderlip-Marcy House. 96 Johnson Street, built soon after the War of 1812.
- **15. Varey House. circ. 1835.** 105 Johnson Street. A regency-style roughcast building with low-pitched, hipped roof built on the fire-damaged foundation of a pre-1812 house.
- **16. Grace United Church. circ. 1852.** Built to the designs of architect William Thomas by a congregation of the "Free" Presbyterians, who, after a reunion in 1875, sold it to the Methodists.
- **17. McClelland's West End Store circ. 1835.** Across the street at 106 Queen Street. The great "T" sign denotes provisioner.
- **18. Mac-Dougal Harrison House, circ. 1820.** 165 Queen Street. Continuing along Queen Street, the block between Gate and Simcoe Streets holds several historical treasures. Once called home by Colonel MacDougal, a veteran of the Battle of Lundy's Lane (1814), a noted public servant and, for many years, treasurer to the united counties of Lincoln, Welland and Haldimand.
- 19. Richardson-Kiely House, circ. 1832. 209 Queen Street. This house was constructed by Charles Richardson, a barrister and Member of Parliament. Later

additions were built at the turn of the century. The property is now operated as a hotel, the Charles Inn, and backs onto the Niagara-on-the-Lake Golf Course, one of the oldest golf courses in Ontario.

- 20. Fort Mississauga. Turn right onto Simcoe and continue to the end where you will see on the far side of the Golf Course. From the vantage point of Fort Mississauga, you have a terrific view of Lake Ontario and across the Niagara River, Fort Niagara in the United States. The all-brick fort was built from 1814–1816 during the War of 1812, to replace nearby Fort George. It was built on a foundation of brick and stone salvaged from rubble left after United States forces sacked the nearby town of Newark in December, 1813. It would help in the defence of Upper Canada the following year, as part of a regional network that included Fort George, Navy Hall, and Butler's Barracks. However, the fort wouldn't be completed until after the war.
- **21. Kirby House, circ. 1832.** 130 Front. This was the home of the 19th Century author and historian of The Golden Dog and The Annals of Niagara, and publisher of The Mail newspaper and collector of customs of the Town of Niagara.
- **22. Old Bank House. circ. 1817.** At the corner of Front and King Streets on Lot No. 1 Town of Niagara. Constructed as the Bank of Upper Canada and used as a bank branch for many years. Now operating as a boutique inn.
- **23. Whale Inn circ. 1835.** 66 King Street. This historical site was originally built as a hotel for sailors and travellers. At the foot of King Street, is a plaque marking the original site of "The Gleaner," one of the first independent newspapers in Upper Canada, published by Andrew Heron in 1817.
- **24. Niagara Harbour and Dock Company site.** Was established in 1831 to expand into an industrial basin responsible for much of Niagara's prosperity prior to 1860. The dock area of Niagara-on-the-Lake has always played an important role in the town's commercial development. It was the earliest location of harbour and dock facilities at the western end of Lake Ontario.
- **25. Niagara Pumphouse.** This was constructed in 1891 and was the town's water pumping station. Completely restored and renovated in 1994, it now serves as the Niagara Pumphouse Visual Art Centre.
- **26.** Navy Hall. Building began in 1765. Is believed to have been part of the complex of converted naval storehouses, used for the first Parliament of Upper Canada. In 1765, British naval craftsmen from Fort Niagara erected a barracks on the opposite side of the Niagara River. Over the years, several buildings, known collectively as Navy Hall, evolved into a key military supply facility for British forts on the upper Great Lakes.
